

The project will include two courts of either Portland cement or asphaltic concrete Estimated cost for the courts, fencing, painting, net and post assemblies and landscaping is \$24, 000 Of that \$12,000 is to be paid by federal grant and the balance by donations Courts will be constructed on land leased by the city from the North Fayette County Community school
